One of the best memories is when we spent Christmas there. We decorated the Christmas tree with hand-made decorations: strung popcorn and chains using colored paper and flour paste. She made time to spend with a little city girl. Another memory is her making biscuits on the wood stove for the crew. They were so good and I have the wooden bowl where she mixed those biscuits.

Lydia Siewert Banke

My grandmother, Lydia, was a very important person in my life. She was the only grandparent I knew, because the other three had died before I was born. Since both of my parents worked, Lydia was often the adult who looked after my brother and me when we were young. Unfortunately for Van and me, we only had our grandmother for part of each year, as she split her time between us and her children in Texas, after her husband had died and left her with no home of her own.

Lydia grew up in rural Texas, as the child of German immigrants. She always spoke with a slight accent, but she was never shy about speaking! She was opinionated and quite vocal, and even though she was crippled with rheumatoid arthritis, she reigned as a gentle matriarch of the Banke family. She was a loyal member of the Philadelphia Presbyterian Church for 25 years, and she rests today in the Philadelphia cemetery.

Katherine Keller Huffman (called Aunt Katie in the community) was the equivalent of the rural N.C. community's social worker. People went to her for butter, eggs, milk, help delivering babies, and assistance when husbands drank up the paycheck. She was fearless in bringing those wayward men to sobriety and weekly church attendance!

Hattie Carswell Swink served as a nurse's aide at the nearby state mental hospital for over 30 years and treated her patients with dignity, all while making the best yeast rolls and strawberry jam in the community.

My paternal grandmother was Mattilu McLeod Foster. I called her "Mamoo," and because I was the first grandchild that became the name she was called by all the grandchildren. She was a wonderful seamstress, quilter, crocheter, and cook. I have an early memory of her sitting with her friends around a quilting frame in the front bedroom of her house. She made clothes for me and Dinah when we were small and made clothes for our Barbie Dolls. People paid her to make cakes for them for special occasions and holidays; her burnt caramel was the best! For many years, we ate Sunday supper with her and my granddaddy, along with my aunt, uncle and cousins.

My maternal grandmother was Lounette Yancey Jeffries; we called her "Mammy." (I guess that name is my fault, too.) She and "Pop" lived on the same street as we did for our entire childhood, just one lot between us, so she was always just a few steps away. As young children, we often roamed between her house and ours, especially when the lot was vacant. She had grown up in a large family and was seemingly the caregiver for everyone else in the family. As a very young child, I remember walking with her to my great-grandmother's house to "help" get her mother ready for bed. She was the person who visited Aunt Ida at the nursing home every week, taking special treats for Ida and others who lived there. Early in her

life, she worked for a local doctor, who taught her how to give injections, so if anyone needed an injection of any kind, they'd call her. She loved flowers and had an amazing rose garden for many years. Her nurturing spirit was evident in all aspects of her life. She was always the person I could pour my heart out to, and she would listen carefully and give good advice. I still miss her and am so grateful to have had her in my life.

My maternal grandmother, Ethel MacLeod Silvey, provided leadership to homemakers throughout Carroll County, GA as a Home Extension Agent. She raised five children on a family farm, and helped her husband sell produce and run a café at the weekly sales barn. She kept daily journals for years of everything from sweeping the floor to cooking meals to making clothes. Her favorite hymn was "Count Your Blessings," and that is how she lived her life – with joy over simple things, like her flowers, and unabashed love for her 14 grandchildren, who called her "Big Mama" with great affection, although she was only five feet tall.

My paternal grandmother, Gertrude Self Simpson, ran a hard-scrabble farm outside of Cedartown, GA with her husband Eli, and managed to put food on the table for her family, including three sons. She nurtured my father, who had lost a leg as a child, taught him independence and helped him build his self-esteem, enough so that he started his own business as an adult. Her focus on self-sufficiency, love of family, and helping others were strong influences in my life.

I am blessed to have known all of my Grandparents. My Father's Mother was Clyde Wray. I have vivid memories of her house and farm. I realize now how hard life was for her and my Grandfather. I have memories of life without indoor plumbing in their house! She was a seamstress in her community. She made matching dresses for my sister and me. She also made clothes for our dolls! I remember her as a good cook!

My Mother's Mother was Besse Cooper. She was a schoolteacher before she married my Grandfather. They actually had to marry secretly because schoolteachers were not permitted to be married at that time! She became a "stay at home Mom" and raised 4 children. They also lived on a farm. She raised her own vegetables and had fruit trees. She canned and froze a lot of food. I remember her as a faithful Christian. She definitely honored the Sabbath and would not allow work to be done on Sunday. She became famous for her longevity and was published by the Guinness World Records as the oldest living person for a time. She lived to be 116 years old!
