### THE CROSSROADS

#### Thoughts from your Pastor,

Patriotic parades, cookouts, concerts and fireworks. Have you ever considered the origins or significance of the symbols associated with these celebrations? For some unknown reason, I recently started to think about the Pledge of Allegiance. My "research" netted info that may be of interest to you.

The Pledge of Allegiance was written in August 1892 by Francis Bellamy (1855-1931) the son of a Baptist minister and a Christian socialist. After preaching in New York and Boston he accepted a job at The Youth's Companion, a family magazine with half a million subscribers.

Bellamy soon set to work arranging a patriotic program for public schools quadri-centennial celebration of Columbus Day. He successfully lobbied Congress for a resolution endorsing the school ceremony, and helped convince President Benjamin Harrison to issue a proclamation declaring a Columbus Day holiday.

He hoped the pledge would be used by citizens in any country so it was to be short, to the point and recited in 15 seconds. Bellamy had also considered using the words "equality" and "fraternity" but decided against it knowing some on his committee were against equality for women and African Americans.

In its original form the Pledge read:

"I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

In 1923, the words, "the Flag of the United States of America" were added so that new immigrants would not confuse loyalties between their birth countries and the United States. Louis Albert Bowman, an attorney from Illinois, was the first to informally initiate the addition of "under God" to the Pledge in the 1940's. In response to the Communist threat in the mid 1950's, President Eisenhower (a Presbyterian) encouraged Congress to add the words "under God," creating the 31-word pledge we say today. Bellamy's daughter objected to this alteration.

The original "Bellamy salute", began with a military salute, and after reciting the words "to the flag," the arm was extended toward the flag. Soon, the pledge was begun with the right hand over the heart, and after reciting "to the Flag," the arm was extended toward the Flag, palm-down. In World War II, the salute resembled the Nazi salute too closely, so congress changed it to keep the right hand over the heart throughout.

Stay safe this summer and take a few moments to read a book or surf the net to discover why we do what we do in our families, our nation and our congregation.
