

<u> Thoughts from your Pastor,</u>

Welcoming Strangers

PPC is known as a warm and welcoming congregation. I am convinced those are strengths that God will use to build and grow the church. Many that God will send to and through our doors are brothers and sisters we have yet to meet. Our ability and willingness to welcome these strangers will help determine the church's' vitality and viability in the days and years ahead.

<u>Christian Hospitality, A Way of Life</u>, a bible study curriculum written by Jason Foster, provides food for though as we seek ways to become even more hospitable to those in our church, homes and elsewhere. The curriculum could well become the basis of a summer study here at PPC. Here are highlights from key concepts he has identified to help us think about that possibility.

Key Concept #1: Christian hospitality, as given to us in the Bible, is a sacred process

of receiving' outsiders and changing them from strangers to guests....the Old Testament (OT) is full of examples of hospitality being extended to strangers who become valued guests both during their actual time together, and beyond. The New Testament (NT) is no different.

Key Concept #2: Hospitality is not a specialized spiritual gift that only a few people possess. While it's true that some may be 'better' at hospitality than others, everyone has a stake in it.

Key Concept #3: There is an indispensable moral component to Christian hospitality...The act of offering welcome is basic to Christian identity and practice. Historically, Christian hospitality was a subversive act that obliterated societal barriers involving gender, race, economic condition, and citizenship status, and also directly attacked the often deadly devaluing of the personhood of 'undesirables'.

Key Concept #4: The entire Christian life can be seen through the grid of Incarnation and Hospitality. 'Incarnation', following the example of Jesus...is the act of proactively entering into the world of others...'Hospitality' is the flip side of 'Incarnation' (it) is the act of inviting other people into our world...

Key Concept #5: Hospitality cannot be separated from the coming of God's Kingdom both now and at the end of history... (It) is not only linked to the initial in-breaking of God's Kingdom into history; it is also the grand picture through which the consummation of all history is presented.


