

Man of the Year - 2024 - Tom Murphy

On Father's Day, our Presbyterian Women honored our 6th annual Man of the Year, a man who has shown dedication to God by service to our Church and community over most of his lifetime. Tom Murphy, this year's Man of the Year has been a member of our Church since he was 10 years old. He is a descendant of the Huie family who were among the founders of this Church 199 years ago -- one of the few members left. And he has currently been a member of our Church longer than anyone else. He was first ordained as a Deacon (which we don't have Deacons anymore) in 1961, and then as an Elder in 1974. He has served on the Session a great number of the years since; on the Finance Committee, Clerk's Committee, Christian Education Committee, as Assistant Treasurer, and more. And he is a faithful Usher on many Sunday mornings. But one of the most memorable ways he has served our Church is as a Youth Leader. When we had a large Youth Group, he and Erwin Gettys helped with the Youth Program here at the Church every Sunday evening for many years. He went with the Youth on Camping Trips, outings, and recreation events. He was very familiar with our rattily old church bus that the youth traveled in, full of our Church's teenagers, to numerous youth events. He has some good stories of those days! Many Thanks to Tom for his years of dedicated service to God, our Church and community, and his family.
