Debbie Bray probably has a similar story to tell – as she took me through the church cemetery when I first got there, she kept saying she was related to this one and that one until I finally asked her – "are you related to everyone here?" And she said "yes – probably!" And of course, that doesn't count the Huies and others in the older Philadelphia/Huie cemetery that she is also related to.

I hope you will be able to visit with your extended family this summer and enjoy a good meal of homemade goodies together. We'll meet for breakfast on June 6 at Eggs Up and picnic together on July 2 to celebrate Independence Day, while we listen to family stories and celebrate the heritage of our country and the founding families of Philadelphia Presbyterian.
