Devotion, First Week of Lent, February 18, 2024 Rev. Jeanne Simpson

The first biblical text for our Lenten journey this year is Psalm 51, which is traditionally read on Ash Wednesday. Psalm 51 is striking not only for its honesty about sin, but also for its confidence in God's merciful love amid the brokenness in our lives and in the world. The psalm is a prayer – a penitential prayer – and you are invited to pray Psalm 51:1-10 this week.
